- 1.3.1.2 **BASE** is a new assessment introduced last academic year as a trial and has replaced PIPS. It is a computer-generated baseline assessment and is used in all ESF Year 1 classes.
- 1.3.1.3 **BASE** measures students' personal, social, and emotional development, along with key skills and concepts in language and mathematics
- 1.3.1.4 There is no comparison as this is the first year of completing the data:


1.3.1.10 Responding to the **InCAS** results:

- Measures skills in Mathematical literacy, reading and writing


1.3.1.12 **ISA** Mean Scale Score (September 2022):

1.3.1.16 Agency:

1.3.1.17 On the horizon:

- Strengthening and collaborating with the secondary mathematics department to further develop the continuums
- Continue to strengthen the SWI approach to learning more about words in regard to spelling, meaning, and how they are used as writers.
- Educating parents about gender bias through admissions/ parent university in the upcoming Parent University.

1.3.2 IB studies follow-up (JD)

JD talked the College Council through the IB Self-Study standards and practices applicable to the role of the Council. Council members shared reflections on where they thought we sat in relation to the standards and practices, rating them as developing, developed, or highly developed. Council members shared evidence to support their reflections, sharing potential next steps for future school development.

4. Principal's Report (HB)

4.1 Number on roll: 988 students in the Primary School and 1097 students in the Secondary School, a total of 2075 students College-wide.

4.2 Staffing:

- 4.2.1 New teacher recruitment is well underway for 2023-24. Seven leavers in the Primary School, eight in the Secondary School, and one all through Social Worker position. More than half of these openings have been filled with the remainder to be hired before the Easter break.
- 4.2.2 Stuart (Stu) Lowe, Learning Technology Specialist at ESF Beacon Hill School has been selected following an international search as the new Vice-Principal for Learning Technologies with Ania Zielinska's departure this summer. Stu has a long and successful track record in ESF leading digital teaching and learning at both the school level and across the Foundation.

4.3 Premises Issues:

Japanese street artist, Taka has been working with teachers and scholars in the Visual Arts department to produce a captivating mural at the MTR entrance on three walls. This project has been several years in the making with delays due to the pandemic.

4.4 Upcoming School/Parent/ Community activities:

Staff spring dinner (3 Feb), ESF Innofair (4 Feb), ESF Design Day (15 Feb), and Year 11 Personal Project Exhibition (11 Feb).

5 Business Manager's Report (SH)

5.1 2022/2023 P&L Report as of 30/11/2022 (first document)

5.1.1 Incomes:

- Tuition fee incomes are slightly below the forecast (2.075 students as of today –the budget was based on 2,084 students). The usual Christmas attrition has been compensated by new students.
- Interest incomes are rising.
- Rental incomes are under the budget as there were still covid related restrictions at the beginning of the school year. A significant improvement should be seen in the coming months.

5.1.2 Expenses:

- Staff expenditures are well contained. The Senior staff salary deficit is compensated by the Interco incomes and is related to two interims of RCHK staff at ESFC and KJS.

- Other expenses are well-contained except for IT and general office expenditures which are usually high at the beginning of the school year.

5.1.3 <u>Interim result:</u>

- Surplus of 1.7 MHKD as of November 2022 but many school activities expenses (EOTC camps) were not paid in full at that time.

5.2 Budget 2023/2024

- 5.2.1 RCHK and ESF are working on the 2023/2024 draft budget
- 5.2.2 The draft budget and the tuition fee increase proposal will be presented by ESF Finance Department at the next College Council Meeting on 21 March 2023. (a Finance Committee Meeting will take place before)

 Post-meeting note: Finance Committee met with CFO, Vivian Cheung, and Senior Executive Ann Chan in ESFC on 8 March 23.
- 5.2.3 Three parameters are important to determine the tuition fee increase:
 - The enrollment forecast done by RCHK 2,077 forecasted in 2023/20234 (compared to 2.084 this year)
 - The staff salary increase decided by ESFC
 - The tuition fee increase decided by ESFC / College Council
 - Current situation:

ESF PRIMARY: 119,100 HKD / RCHK PRIMARY: 133,000 HKD + 11.6% ESF MYP Y7: 159,300 HKD / RCHK MYP: 176,000 HKD + 10.48% ESF MYP Y8-111: 137,600 HKD / RCHK MYP: 176,000 HKD + 27.9% ESF DP: 144,700 HKD / RCHK DP: 178,000 HKD +23%


5.4.1 Swimming pool sound baffles / acoustic ceiling (Christmas 2022)

7. ESF School Council Report (CBDC)

- 7.1 CBDC updated the council with the recent events across ESF schools.
- 7.2 A big highlight of Term 2 was the official opening of Island School on 11 Jan 2023
- 7.3 ESF was currently in the "Fees and Pay" season. Key meeting dates related to deciding on Fees and Pay included: Remuneration Committee (23 Feb), Finance Committee (15 Mar) and Board meeting (27 Mar).
- 7.4 Overall admission continues to remain strong across ESF schools.
- 7.5 Teaching staff attrition rate this year as of January is 6.75%, compared to 14.5% (1 year ago), 6.3% (2 years ago), and 7.2% (3 years ago). The attrition rate for EA/support staff is high this year.
